NEW ADDRESS FOR ARTICLES TO BE PUBLISHED IN THE IALE-BULLETIN

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IALE-PORTUGAL FOUNDED!

The Portuguese Association for Landscape Ecology was created in January 1999. It is called "Associação Portuguesa de Ecologia da Paisagem" (APEP), and its foundation was formalised on the 13th of January - through the official registration in the Portuguese administrative system of the Statutes by nine founding members. The Statutes follow the Statutes of IALE and state that the APEP is the regional chapter of IALE and respects therefore its rules and procedures, members of the APEP automatically being members of IALE.

The activities leading to the foundation of the APEP started in December 1997, with a session on Landscape Ecology perspectives in Portugal included in the yearly Congress of the Portuguese Society of Ecology. Following to the high participation of this session, in March 1998 took place the first Landscape Ecology Workshop in Portugal. This workshop was held in the region of Alentejo, with one day conferences and posters, followed by two days of field visits and research project presentations in the field, and a final day of discussions with approximately 50 participants from various disciplines, including 5 invited speakers from abroad. The participants in this workshop approved the interest in creating a Portuguese Association for Landscape Ecology, and an executive commission of eight persons was formed to launch the Association.

In December 1998 a one-day workshop took place in Lisbon, with the objective of discussing the aim and scope of Landscape Ecology in Portugal and of preparing the formalisation of the Association. Besides international invited speakers and 40 participants, representatives from the Ministry of Agriculture (Environmental Monitoring Department) and from the Ministry of the Environment (Nature Conservation Institute) also participated and demon-

strated their interest in the future Association and in what Landscape Ecology could bring them as support for decision making in the management of our landscapes. The future activities of the Association were discussed and those who were interested subscribed to the Association.

The Association has now 25 members (but more are expected!), coming from different disciplines, and working at the University, research or technical/administrative entities at different levels. The executive commission formed last March is still in charge now, until the first General Assembly where the elections of the Board and other bodies will take place, on the 19th of April.

2000 WORLD CONFERENCE ON NATURAL RESOURCE MODELLING 26-30 June 2000

Meeting of the "Resource Modelling Association" (RMA)

The theme: "THE ECOLOGY OF SCALE"

The emphasis of the conference will be on spatially explicit models. Spatial scale is of fundamental importance for ecological theory. The description of any system depends on the spatial perspective chosen; hence it is essential to understand not only how patterns and dynamics vary with scale, but also how patterns at one scale are manifestations of processes operating at other scales. The challenge is to translate this insight into natural resource modelling and applications of such modelling to resource economy and management issues.

Location

The 2000 WORLD CONFERENCE ON NATURAL RESOURCE MODELLING will be the first RMA conference held in the Netherlands. The conference is planned at Wageningen International Conference Centre (WICC) in Wageningen. Wageningen is an old, small town situated along the beautiful river Rhine. The Dutch call it "City of Liberation" as on 5 May 1945 the German army capitulated here, which was the end of World War II for the Netherlands. Apart from the bustling research and small-scale industrial activities, there is a lively social atmosphere exemplified by the numerous downtown cafes and restaurants. Visitors will enjoy the relaxed atmosphere,

especially when taking a bicycle tour into the countryside or simply by strolling around town during a visit of the weekly open-air market.

Aim

The conference will bring together scientists working world-wide on renewable resource modelling, both ecological and economic, in order to present and discuss new developments in the application of such modelling to resource management issues. Fields of application will include forestry, fisheries, agriculture, wildlife, rangelands, biological conservation and multiple land use. The main aim of the conference is exchange of ideas on natural resource modelling across disciplines.

Scientific programme and social activities

The scientific conference programme will include keynote talks, oral and poster contributions. Social activities will include a welcome reception, a special conference dinner, an all-day excursion on Wednesday 28 June on coastal/fisheries/wetland themes and an afternoon excursion on Friday 30 June to the collection of Van Gogh's paintings and sculpture garden in the Kroller-Muller museum in "De Hoge Veluwe" National Park.
