FROM THE IALE - PRESIDENT

Greetings to all IALE members, and best wishes for 2001. 2000 was a busy year in landscape ecology, with numerous meetings and events, and I hope that there will be even more activity in 2001.

In September, we had an IALE Executive meeting in Bangor, UK, after the IALE(UK) conference. At this meeting we set in train a number of initiatives which we hope will provide more benefits for members and facilitate communication across the large and somewhat diffuse association. The perennial problem in IALE is that it is a large and diffuse organization with relatively few funds to draw on. Fortunately, we now have a slightly better funding base thanks to income from the Snowmass Congress. Initiatives discussed include:

- upgrading the IALE website, including setting up a web domain
- electronic distribution of the Bulletin to all members with email
- Support for young scientists (for visits, short courses etc)
- Visiting speakers program (to promote inter-regional communication)

More details on these later.

We also discussed problems experienced by members in relation to the journal Landscape Ecology – I hope these have now been fixed, but if members continue to have problems with receipt of the journal, keep letting us know, via Rob Jongman.

I am also happy to announce that IALE has reached agreement with Cambridge University Press to mount a Landscape Ecology Series. The details of this are still being

finalized, but John Wiens will be Editor of the series, backed up by an editorial board. The series will aim to encourage the publication of high quality material in Landscape Ecology, and suggestions for possible books are welcome: contact John in the first instance (jaws@lamar.colostate.edu).

Next year the European Congress (Development of European Landscapes) is scheduled for 3-6 July which runs in Stockholm and Tartu (Estonia), with a ferry ride between the two locations. LANDSCAPE ECOLOGY IN CHINA

Landscape Ecology was introduced into China in early 1980s. Research work was first conducted in the mountains and Loess Plateau and then later in suburban areas. Many scientific projects and papers on these subjects have appeared since then. So far more than 500 papers and books on Landscape Ecology have been published, about 30 of which are in English, with study areas ranging from natural landscapes like forest and wetlands, to

agricultural and urban landscapes. The *major papers* are available as pdf-file together with this IALE Bulletin under under http://www.wsl.ch/land/iale/bulletin.htm. Three national conferences (1989, 1996 and 1999) and one international conference have been organized, which greatly accelerated Landscape Ecology research in China. The IALE-China branch was established in 1996. Its 200 members are mainly from the Institute of Applied Ecology, and the Research Center for Ecology and Environment (both of which belong to the Chinese Academy of Sciences), along with other members from Beijing and Yunnan Universities. Apart from these organizations, other organizations that can provide high level landscape ecological education include the Beijing Forestry University, Eastern China Normal University, Institute of Geography and Resources, CAS, etc. According to the specific situation of China, with its extensive area, large population, and long history of agriculture, landscape ecologists in China have mainly focused on the cultural-natural landscapes as well as managed landscapes, while paying more attention to ecological construction at landscape and regional scales. Along the coast in Eastern China, rapid economic development in the last 20 years has created many problems. Landscape changes in this area are closely related to landuse transformation. In the delta regions such as Pearl River Delta, Yangtze River Delta, and area around Bohai sea,

the rapid urbanization and industrialization have put great pressure on the environment. Many research projects are focused on this area, in an effort to ease development pressures through rational landscape planning. Since the year 2000, the Chinese government has launched a new policy to quicken development steps in western China, emphasizing ecological construction in arid and erodable regions. In the near future, other ecological projects will focus on catchment basins, oases and desertification. We believe that the development of landscape ecology should keep us with national development, so that more support can be obtained. At least this should hold true in developing countries like China.

L'Ecologie du paysage est un champ de recherche de l'écologie qui s'intéresse aux interactions entre patrons spatiaux et processus écologiques.
